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the basis for the film starring scarlett johansson award winning author michel faber's under the skin blends elements of science fiction grotesque comedy horror and thriller into a genre jumping meditation washington post book world isserley cruises the scottish highlands picking up hitchhikers scarred and awkward yet strangely erotic and threatening she listens to her hitchhikers as they open up to her revealing clues about who might miss them if they should disappear under the skin takes us on a heart thumping ride through dangerous territory our own moral instincts and the boundaries of compassion a fascinating psychological thriller that hovers between the real and the fantastic baltimore sun original and unsettling an animal farm for the new century wall street journal a satiric novel eerie and touching in equal parts san francisco

research paper postgraduate from the year 2018 in the subject didactics for the subject english literature works grade 1 30 university of passau department of english literature and culture course adapting scotland language english abstract with his novel under the skin michael faber addresses the limitations of society and identity which are typical themes of modern scottish arts as well as the scottish mentality in faber s novel the protagonist isserley is caught in a constant struggle of defining herself in which way is isserley s process of constructing an identity problematical being a hybrid result of surgery isserley shares similarities and differences with more than one species this inevitably influences her perception of herself and others the process of shaping her identity based on appearance is characterised by continual constructions and deconstructions in which the murky demarcations between bodies prove to be an additional difficulty assuming that body and identity are mutually generative and that an identity is thus partly constructed through the body this paper firstly explores the natural body of isserley s species as a lost marker for identification secondly the body of the non human animal is brought into discussion due to its familiarity thirdly there will be a focus on the vodsel body as a source of inner conflict for isserley with regard to the issue of gender in relation to animals after analysing the linguistic development in the protagonist s construction of an identity the paper takes a closer look at the final scene

intercultural screen adaptation offers a wide ranging examination of how film and television adaptations and non adaptations interact with the cultural social and political environments of their national transnational and post national contexts with screen adaptations examined from across britain europe south america and asia this book tests how examining the processes of adaptation across and within national frameworks challenges traditional debates around the concept of nation in film media and cultural studies with case studies of films such as under the skin 2013 and t2 trainspotting 2017 as well as tv adaptations like war and peace 2016 and narcos 2015 2017 intercultural screen adaptation offers readers an invigorating look at adaptations from a variety of critical perspectives incorporating the uses of landscape nostalgia and translation

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this collection of essays centers on literary representations of meat eating bringing aesthetic questions into dialogue with more established research on the ethics and politics of meat from the decline of traditional animal husbandry to the emergence of intensive agriculture and the biotechnological innovation of in vitro meat the last hundred years have seen dramatic changes in meat production meat consumption has risen substantially inciting the emergence of new forms of political subjectivity such as the radical rejection of meat production in veganism featuring essays on both canonical and lesser known authors literature and meat since 1900 illustrates the ways in which our meat regime is shaped reproduced and challenged as much by cultural and imaginative factors as by political contestation and moral reasoning

reading slaughter abattoir fictions space and empathy in late modernity examines literary depictions of slaughterhouses from the development of the industrial abattoir in the late nineteenth century to today the book focuses on how increasing and ongoing isolation and concealment of slaughter from the surrounding society affects readings and depictions of slaughter and abattoirs in literature and on the degree to which depictions of animals being slaughtered creates an avenue for empathic reactions in the reader or the opportunity for reflections on human animal relations through chapters on abattoir fictions in relation to narrative empathy anthropomorphism urban spaces rural spaces human identities and horror fiction sune borkfelt contributes to debates in literary animal studies human animal studies and beyond

future folk horror contemporary anxieties and possible futures analyzes folk horror by looking at its recent popularity in novels and films such as the ritual 2011 the witch 2015 and candyman 2021 countering traditional views of the genre as depictions of the monstrous rural and pagan past trying to consume the present the contributors to this collection posit folk horror as being able to uniquely capture the anxieties of the twenty first century caused by an ongoing pandemic and the divisive populist politics that have arisen around it further this book shows how through its increasing intersections with other genres such as science fiction the weird and eco criticism as seen in films and texts like the zero theorem 2013 the witcher 2007 2021 and annihilation 2018 as well as through its engagement with topics around climate change racism and identity politics folk horror can point to other ways of being in the world and visions of possible futures

this study looks at the complex relationship between postmodernism and the fantastic in contemporary british fiction and shows that a new type of the fantastic arises in postmodernism arguing against interpretations that view postmodernism as inherently fantastic it seeks to define the postmodern fantastic as a narrative mode that is influenced by certain traits both of the traditional fantastic and of literary postmodernism but does not simply conflate both in the first theoretical part a number of theories of the fantastic and of postmodernism are used to set the fantastic apart from other non mimetic forms of literature and to create a model of the postmodern fantastic that postulates the totalisation of the fantastic in postmodernism in the second part of this study this model is applied to a number of contemporary british texts which are particularly

susceptible to this form of the fantastic due to several characteristics such as their muted kind of postmodernism and their frequent construction of parallel worlds the analysis of these texts focuses on four thematic fields of the postmodern fantastic the figure of the other as defined by bernhard waldenfels time and history text and textuality and the development of the toodorovian pure fantastic finally the question of the death of the fantastic in postmodernism is examined

body gothic assesses the role and relevance of corporeal transgression in literature and film of the last three decades from splatterpunk and body horror to torture porn and surgical horror

deft and lyrical this paperback edition of michel faber s collection of stories is his first since his auspicious debut some rain must fall it has sealed his reputation as one of britain s most daring and original authors acclaimed for his pitch perfect prose and brilliant characterisation faber is also celebrated for his mastery of contrasting styles from achingly sad lost lives through moments of exquisitely distilled happiness to biblical innocence and savagery faber s characters are redeemed abandoned beloved and laid bare
